John Parsons, a 40-year veteran of the National Park Service, served as Associate Regional Director in Washington from 1977 to his retirement in 2008 where he represented the Secretary of Interior on the National Capital Planning Commission and the District of Columbia Zoning Commission. He was also Chairman of the National Capital Memorial Advisory Commission.

He directed the planning, development, land acquisition, legislative and cultural resource programs for the 80,000-acre National Park System in and around Washington, DC.

Mr. Parsons was awarded the Department of the Interior's highest honor, the Distinguished Service Medal, and is a fellow in the American Society of Landscape Architects which awarded him the 2003 LaGasse Medal in recognition of his leadership in protecting and enhancing National Parklands. In 2006, he was awarded the Herbert Adams Medal by the National Sculpture Society for his support of sculpture in national memorials. In 2008, The Mayor of The District of Columbia presented him with a Lifetime Achievement Award for his significant contributions in historic preservation in the Nation's Capital.
